## What Lies Beneath?

Many of us will have passed the flashes on Ollershaw Lane and wondered what remains are under there. The photo shows the foundations of the buildings long since submerged under the water, visible for a short time when the flashes were drained some years ago.



How many of us have told our children of hidden houses and buildings under the water and built up stories around them? Or told stories of buildings there in the morning and gone by the afternoon,

swallowed up by the mine workings underneath. Or pointed to the pipe that sits above the water line and said it belongs to the old Adelaide Mine workings, or it was the chimney of a submerged house and wove stories of people disappearing with their homes, or that it was the school house and on certain nights you could hear the tolling of the bell and cries of the children.

This is how myths, legends and folklore begin. They are often stories that are told one generation to the next, adding half-forgotten truths to events or people around us. The art of storytelling is somewhat lost these days with the growth of media access and increasingly busy lives. Perhaps we should revive some of these tales or invent some new ones to pass on to the next generation.

What we now think of as fairy tales were often gruesome and disturbing stories, the Brothers Grimm stories contained descriptions of mutilations, sexual misconduct and death. Thankfully those stories of people nailed

into barrels and thrown down hills or into ponds have been lost over time or made into nicer stories for children. There may have been problems getting children to sleep after hearing those original stories, Disney tells them much sweeter! We will not find in Disney's Cinderella, the ugly sisters chopping off bits of their feet to fit in the glass slipper, their eyes pecked out by doves or, in Snow White, the Wicked Queen forced to dance in red hot iron shoes until she dies at Snow White's wedding.

### **Ultrafast broadband arrives in Marston!**

The Connecting Cheshire Partnership is delighted to announce that work to provide Fibre to the Premise (FTTP) broadband is now complete. Around 45 premises, primarily in the vicinity of CW9 6ER & CW6 9DL, are now able to upgrade from the new fibre network served from the Northwich telephone exchange. Check the Connecting Cheshire website to see if your home or business can be upgraded and then contact your Internet Service Provider or shop around for the best deal before ordering a fibre broadband service. Please note:

1. Be aware that this does not mean every premise in every postcode will be reached. Also it is possible that some premises will be too far from the nearest distribution point to benefit. Concerns about connectivity can be raised directly with Openreach.
2. As this locality will benefit from fibre to the premise technology, there are a limited number of internet service providers selling FTTP at present – they include BT Retail, PlusNet and Zen. As more technology becomes more widely available, more providers will join the market.

## Parish News – Planning Application Objection

### **Update on Planning Application for the “Tour and Store” caravan storage site - 18/04713/FUL – Temporary change of use from scrap metal yard to caravan and general storage.**

Councillors have been inundated with enquiries from residents regarding the retrospective planning application submitted to Cheshire West and Chester Council (CWAC) for the caravan storage site in the area of land behind The Salt Barge following an article in the on-line Northwich Guardian. The Parish Council has objected to the planning application together with a number of local residents and members of the MaRCH (Marston Residents Conservation and Heritage) group. These objections along with the application details can be seen on the CWAC website ([www.cheshirewestandchester.gov.uk](http://www.cheshirewestandchester.gov.uk)). We also have placed the objections on our own website [www.marstonparishcouncil.org.uk](http://www.marstonparishcouncil.org.uk).

The submitted PC’s objections are based on:

- Operation without planning consent.
- Not in Accordance with Local Plan (Part 1)
- States an additional access point
- Results in increased traffic movements
- Affects Conservation and Heritage sites

MPC and MaRCH submitted information to CWAC last year on up to 7 sites behind The Salt Barge where land has been cleared, materials dumped and unpermitted buildings erected. Serious land clearance and destruction has occurred in an area of natural beauty abutting the Conservation Areas and SSSI’s. The current caravan storage site has been constructed and operational for 12 months without planning permission and with a website advertising its services.

The main points of Marston Parish Council’s objection is summarised below.

- It contravenes the objectives of the Local Plan.
- The size of the development is not in keeping with a small rural community adjacent to conservation and heritage sites. and advertises it will provide “...capacity for hundreds of caravans, motorhomes, boats and trailers.” And that they will provide for “Any large vehicles including horse boxes”.
- There is a new and altered access route. This is a contravention

of an existing Traffic Management Plan and storage already has caused nuisance to residents of The Avenue. The tarmacked track installed with no drainage provision has contributed to increased flooding of gardens.

- In addition the proximity of Cart Lane to the traffic lights at the Trent and Mersey canal bridge would cause further congestion and, we believe, a potential accident risk. Marston Parish Council believes neither of the access points, The Avenue or Cart Lane, is appropriate so the site should not be allowed to continue.
- More large vehicles cannot be accommodated in a village where parking spaces are limited and Ollershaw Lane is already plagued by HGV traffic using the road as a short-cut.
- The trees and hedges that were surrounding the site have already been removed. The site is surrounded by areas of conservation, SBIs and areas of high biological quality. CWCC Local Plan Part 1 STRAT 1 states development should: “Protect, enhance and improve the natural and historic environment whilst enhancing and restoring degraded and spoilt land seeking opportunities for habitat creation”. This development does not do either.
- The natural fall of the land towards Ashton’s and Neumann’s Flashes has been blocked or inhibited by the development. The site is covered by impervious or partially impervious surface material which is so large that the proposed soakaway is unlikely to accommodate the run-off. MPC objects to the application on the grounds that this contributes to local flooding of the area impacting on residents’ amenity.
- The site and surrounding areas has a detrimental effect on Biodiversity and Geological Conservation on the following criteria:
  - Protected and priority species
  - Designated sites, important habitats or other biodiversity features
  - Features of geological conservation importance
  - The area is surrounded by conservation areas and sites of biological importance which include:

- The Heritage Site of The Lion Salt Works
  - Trent and Mersey Conservation Area
  - Marston Meadows, Grade A SBI
  - Ashton’s and Neumann’s, Grade A SBI
  - Marbury Lime Bed and Forge Pool, Grade A SBI
  - Forge Wood, Grade C SBI
  - SSSI site off Neumann’s Flash
- As stated on their website the Tour and Store operation is open “24 hours, 7 days a week” and “365 days per year” offering unaccompanied access for customers who will have an entrance pass. Movements will impact on the amenity of local residents in The Avenue, Cart Lane and Ollershaw Lane. MPC objects to the application on the grounds that any increase in the volume of traffic at any time on Cart Lane, The Avenue or Ollershaw Lane will seriously impact of the amenities of the community.

To summarise, the site has operated without planning consent and has a deleterious effect on our community. It blatantly ignores planning law, the Local Plan and national guidelines. It uses an unapproved and inappropriate access point. Increased traffic movements have, and will continue, to cause nuisance and increase accident risk. It has, and will continue, to cause severe damage to biodiversity and community health and wellbeing. Considerable investment has quite rightly been given to the prestigious Cheshire Heritage Site of The Lion Salt Works. The proposed development is not in keeping, and damages, the historical and cultural nature of Marston and affects the many visitors, boating community and walkers.

This application clearly conflicts in all areas of its application proposal and we therefore support its refusal and the enforced closure of the caravan storage facility

MPC have asked CWAC councillors to call the application to full Planning Committee where MPC and residents will be able to speak against, or for, the proposal. Check planning dates. MaRCH would ask you to support residents of the Avenue and Ollershaw Lane and you have the right to attend the Planning Committee meeting.

# Summary Minutes of Marston Parish Council Meeting 9<sup>th</sup> January 2019

**Councillors:** It was with sadness that the Parish Council accepted the resignation of Councillor Gerrard McGahern. The council thanked him for his commitment and efforts whilst on the council. We do, however, welcome two new councillors; Dave Collier and Rachel Bates.

**Planning Applications:** Two planning applications were received by the council during the Christmas break.

18/04713/FUL for the change of use of what was Dixies Autos to a caravan and general store. The council has been in communication with CW&C for many months about illegal operations within this and surrounding areas. The Parish Council submitted an objection, we await the result. Two councillors attended a meeting with Enforcement on 6/12/18 before the application was announced, they reported back with the current situation concerning all of the areas behind and off Cart Lane and The Avenue, much of which is still under investigation.

18/04376/FUL for the erection of a detached house in the side garden of 4 Cross Street. Many residents have complained over the past year about issues with parking and access within Cross Street and so the council submitted an objection, we await the result.

**Christmas and New Year:** The Parish Council Community Christmas event on Friday 14/12/18 was well attended by adults but sadly no children so Santa had a very lonely time. Donations and tombola raised £94. One of our residents from the Park Homes; Pam Mann, hosted a New Year's Eve party at the hall and raised £49.44. Thanks were extended to Pam and her team.

**2019/2020 Budget:** The budget was agreed and signed off. The increase in the precept will help to fund necessary refurbishment of the hall, especially the heating system.

**Defibrillators:** The purchase and siting of defibrillators was again discussed. The council is awaiting a response from CW&C about the siting of a defibrillator in Higher Marston and further discussions about suitable siting at Lower Marston will take place at a later date.

**Date of the next Parish Council meeting.** Please note that due to exceptional circumstances the date of the next MPC meeting is changed from 13<sup>th</sup> February to 20<sup>th</sup> February.

**Demolition of the Coronation Building.** This is the old salt warehouse on the left of the Ollershaw Lane canal bridge. At time of going to print we are preparing to discuss the future of the site with CWAC.

In the deep mid-winter  
Frosty wind made moan.

I heard this beautiful, plaintive  
hymn on the radio over the  
Festive season, remembering it  
from my childhood days in  
Worcester. The winters really

were like that; frost's fragile white crystals outlined spider's webs like knitted dishcloths strewn over the bushes along the garden path. And fern frost painted the windows of our house, its regular geometric pattern like a monochromed kaleidoscope, both inside and out.

Then the snow, several inches deep like an iced cake, an untouched layer of purity and then the muffled crunch of our black wellington boots breaking into the crisp white surface on our walk to school. I remember the excitement as the 3.30pm school bell rang out and we tumbled home, eager to start building the biggest snowman of the neighbourhood. Rolling and heaving the ball of snow round the garden until we could not move it at all, we then piled the snow with our mitten covered hands, first the body then the head, finishing with a carrot nose and coal piece eyes; the snowman was completed with coal buttons down his substantial girth and dad's brown checked scarf carefully tied around its cold neck.

Joy dissolved to discomfort as wet woollen gloves were peeled off to reveal purple-red fingers stinging and bitten by our work in the snow. And, as the fire warmed our toes, the itching, jumping, pinging pain of chilblains began.

Lovely memories; enjoyed in the comforting warmth of my central heating!
