Summer is here and hopefully we are feeling the benefit of vaccinations giving us more confidence in our health and enjoying the long days and contact with family and friends again.

We are looking forward to seeing old friends and new at the weekly coffee mornings and around the village.

15th July is St. Swithin's Day, but where does this legend come from and is there any truth to it? What is the story of St Swithin?

The old poem goes like this...

"St Swithin's Day, if it does rain
Full forty days, it will remain
St Swithin's Day, if it be fair
For forty days, t'will rain no more"



Swithin was a man born in or around the year 800. He became Bishop of Winchester. Unlike other religious figures, he asked not to be buried in a prominent place within Winchester Cathedral, but outside in a simple tomb "where the sweet rain of heaven may fall upon my grave". The legend says after his remains were moved inside there was a great storm and it rained for many weeks after.

Is there any truth to the folklore?

According to the old saying, if it rains on St Swithin's Day it will rain for the next 40 days. If St Swithin's Day is dry, the next 40 days will also be dry. No one takes the prediction literally - in fact, few take it seriously! - and there is definitely no statistical evidence to support the claim. Weather experts says that since records began in 1861, there has never been a record of 40 dry or 40 wet days in a row following St Swithin's Day.

So, while we might not like 40 days of rain, and 40 days of sun sounds fun, neither is likely to happen!

There will be no Marston Murmurs over the summer whilst we take a break, we will return in September.

Nicho's Café



As you may know residents of Ashwood Park have been liaising with the owner to see common sense about its plans to demolish the café. The site is owned by Tingdene and they recently applied to Cheshire West and Chester Council for planning permission to build another four homes and to demolish the café.

On 1st June many of the residents turned out to show their support for the status quo to remain. In fact, more than 250 people, including 150 residents, have signed a petition appealing to Tingdene to withdraw their application.

Many reasons have been put forward to support the case for keeping the café, including: the facilities within the current building and those before it have been utilised by current and past residents for over 35 years and that the café has always provided a functional amenity and social hub for residents and the surrounding community, many of whom do not drive, have a disability, live alone, and/or rely on the café to provide meals and use this facility for social interaction. Contrary to what the application claims, there are no similar facilities less than two and a half km away and for those who don't drive, the area is not served by a bus service and so getting to other facilities can be difficult

There are also safety concerns with the issue of speeding on Chapel Street and that the visibility along the road is poor even without these new homes being built.

Marion Potts, chair of Marston Parish Council, said she was keen to show her support to the residents of Ashwood Park.

She said: "We only found out about it very recently [*as the café is technically in Wincham*], but it does impact on Marston too because there aren't many facilities in the village. The existing cafe is well used and it just seems wrong to

remove the one facility we have like this in the area, especially as most of the people who live in Wincham and Marston are older people”.

Parish Councillor Vacancy

Summary Minutes of Marston Parish Council Meeting of 9th June 2021

The parish council has reported a number of issues around the village, particularly on Higher Marston, including overgrown hedges and verges, blocked drains and disrepair of the bus stop at Hall Drive/Marston Lane.

Wincham Parish Council are setting up a working party to try and tackle the problems surrounding use of Pickmere Lake. We are already involved with Pickmere Residents Association and hope to get involved with this too. Any developments will be reported back to you through Marston Murmurs.

The ongoing issues with the landowners of land to the rear of Ollershaw Lane and Northwich Metals and Tour & Store continue. Their appeal against enforcement for the building of sheds without planning permission has recently been heard. The appeal (APP/A0665/C/20/3247759) was denied, and they have until November to remove the buildings. The appeal (APP/A0665/W/20/3261755) for the erection of a cattle shed on the land was also heard, this appeal has been upheld and the cattle shed can now be built under conditions.

Bits 'n' Bobs

Gardening Jobs - July

- Move your house plants out of doors for the summer. Give the leaves a dust and a shower, then give the roots a feed and a good soaking
- Give hanging basket plants a trim to encourage them to bush out. Feed once a week and water once a day
- Strawberry plants will have thrown out runners by now. Pin them onto the surface of pots of compost and keep them well watered, they will root and can then be severed from the main plant then be used to plant up a new bed for next year
- Re-sow your seeds ... typically we make a frenzy of sowings late spring, early summer and then sit back and watch everything grow. This leads to a wonderful heap of produce and flowers in July and August, but little beyond. Sowing again now will extend the season until Autumn, Winter and into next Spring, and is easy when the ground is warm and seeds can be sown direct

Gardening Jobs - August

- Harvesting may be your busiest task this month, do it regularly and frequently. There is a big difference between a French Bean picked when sweet, tender and tiny and one that should have been picked a week ago, that difference is what makes growing your own worthwhile
- Potato blight can devastate your crop very quickly and arrives in late summer in warm and wet weather. Look out for rotting or shrivelling leaves and brown patches on stems. Dig up and use any affected crops as soon as possible
- Sow Green Manures ... sold as big packets of seeds to be sown directly onto fallow earth. There they germinate and grow quickly and thickly, covering the soil. There are several reasons for sowing a green manure. The main point is to create bulky organic matter that can be dug into the soil to improve its structure, a great solution if you want to give your soil a treat but don't have access to farmyard manure or lots of compost. They also drag up nutrients from the soil and make them more easily available to your plants. They also germinate so thickly they prevent weeds from getting a toehold

Strawberry & Banana Ice Lollies



Making these colourful, fresh, fruity ice lollies is child's play, but grown-ups are sure to want to eat one too

MAKES 8, READY IN 10 minutes, plus freezing time, & no COOKING

Ingredients

- 2 bananas, chopped
- 400g strawberries, hulled and roughly chopped
- 200g pure squeezed orange juice
- 2 tbsp clear honey

Method

In a blender, whizz all the ingredients together until completely combined and smooth. Pour into moulds and freeze for at least 4 hours or until completely frozen.

Best Kept Front Garden



Gardens are a key feature of the summer and we like to celebrate this with our annual Best Kept Front Gardens Competition. Last year we were pleased to see many gardens were worthy of being crowned ‘best kept front garden’ and the choice was very difficult. This year we are introducing Gold and Silver Award

Certificates as well as the silver cup for the best overall garden. Councillors will be coming around the village in late July. So, gardening gloves on and dig up those weeds!

Just in case your garden is too perfect, we have some gardening tips from our non-expert gardener councillor. These are tips learned by trying hard to develop a great garden but failing miserably (and obviously all in jest).

1. Buy a dog, this will save you hours of digging by digging up your borders for you.



2. Replace plants on a regular basis, get fed up, build dog proof fencing from pallets. Try to pretend they look good by planting with flowers to compensate for the fact that you now can't see the flowers in the flowerbed.

3. Borrow an old hay trailer to move dismantled stable, put in garden until stable is needed again. Realise after 5 years it's still not moved. You now own a hay trailer and dismantled stable but it's good for storing logs under and keeping the dog out of the flower beds.

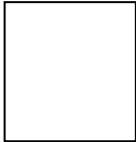
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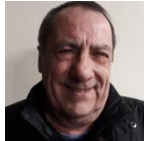
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
