David Gosling, Fingerpost Restorer

This is the first of a series of three pieces about our fingerpost; where it has been over recent months and what we've done with it and how we got it back again. We approached a fingerpost restorer, David Gosling, and in his own words he has given us a short resumé of who he is and how he came to restoring fingerposts.

At the age of 52, and with a long and successful career in retail management behind me, I embarked upon a complete change in direction and one that twenty years later would bring me to the Cheshire village of Marston. Not that I knew I was taking a complete change in direction at the time as all I was doing those twenty years ago was responding to a request, I say request but it was more an edict, from my wife who at a parish council meeting volunteered me to restore the traditional cast iron fingerpost in our village.

At the time of this first restoration I was gainfully employed as the Director of Branded Products at Newcastle United Football Club, an interesting position not least because I am a Sunderland supporter, working alongside the likes of Ruud Gullit and Sir Bobby Robson, but the restoration was an interesting diversion from the day to day retail stuff.

Whilst carrying out the restoration I would joke with my neighbour about how we could take pictures of signs we had restored and stick them on a website and maybe even start a business doing this work.

This first project when complete attracted a lot of interest and the parish soon requested the same job on a second post they had within the parish boundary and although Cumbria County Council's Highways team were happy for these restorations to go ahead, they were becoming concerned that other parishes were starting to carry out restorations of their own posts with very mixed results. It was at this point that I suggested a guideline and specification document should be produced and issued to any parish wishing to carry out such work so that a good standard of restoration could be achieved. When my 'highways' contact said that, although he agreed with me, he had no time in which to pull together such a document I quickly volunteered and this together with a chance meeting with an ITN newsreader was the catalyst in setting up Signpost Restoration Limited.

Maintaining my retail career was important to me and the intention was to carry out the restoration of traditional fingerposts in my spare time and with the help of friends. By the end of 2002 I was working for a team of shopping centre management specialists and was managing a new outlet shopping centre being built in County Durham by ING Real Estate.

My 'Guideline & Specification' document had been accepted by Cumbria County Council as their standard for restoring traditional fingerposts and was beginning to be adopted by other English counties and promoted as the best way of doing things. The restoration work was growing organically, as neighbouring parishes were witnessing what had been achieved and were asking for their fingerposts to get the same treatment. The photogenic qualities of a newly restored fingerpost was leading to much media attention when projects were completed and the resulting publicity meant that orders were being received from throughout England and Wales. This rising demand meant that I could retire from the retail trade; at the time I was managing a shopping centre in Bologna, and could concentrate all my energy on restoring fingerposts.

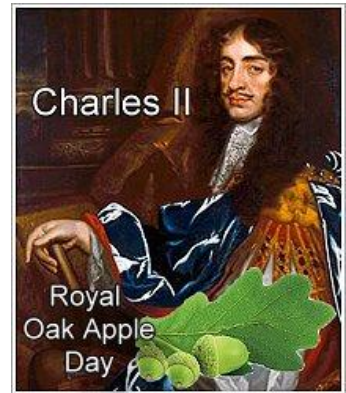
May traditionally has two Bank Holidays, May Day and the Spring Bank Holiday, but before this another holiday used to be celebrated.

Royal Oak Day
29 May

Royal Oak Day (Oak Apple Day) was a public holiday celebrated in England on 29 May to commemorate the restoration of the English monarchy, in May 1660.

"Parliament had ordered the 29th of May, the King's birthday, to be forever kept as a day of thanksgiving for our redemption from tyranny and the King's return to his government, he returning to London that day."

Samuel Pepys's Diary 1st June 1660



The English Civil War 1642-1649 was fought between the royalist forces loyal to King Charles I and the parliamentarians led by Oliver Cromwell. The Royalists were defeated at the Battle of Naseby in 1645 and Charles I was caught and executed on 30 January 1649. Cromwell declared Britain a republic 'The Commonwealth' and went on to become its Lord Protector. Following his death in 1658 Cromwell was succeeded briefly by his son Richard before the monarchy was restored and Charles II became king on 29 May 1660.

Oak Apple Day was a time for dancing and parties. To show their support for the monarchy, people wore sprigs of oak leaves or a sprig with an oak apple on (gall produced in oak buds by wasps). On 29 May, children would challenge each other to show their oak sprigs or apples, and those not



wearing one would face some form of punishment, varying from one place to another.

"**Pinch-Bum-Day**" - a pinch on the bottom

"**Nettle Day**" - whipping with nettles

"The wise boy wore his oak leaves, armed himself (sic) with a stinging nettle and carried a few dock leaves for first aid just in case"

In some areas it was necessary to wear the oak sprig only until noon; after that one was safe. In the 1890s many railway engines were decorated with boughs of oak on 29 May.

It is said that King Charles' life was saved after the battle of Worcester in 1651, when he escaped from the Roundhead army by hiding in an oak tree in the grounds of Boscobel House in Staffordshire.

Although the public holiday was abolished in 1859, Oak Apple Day continues to be celebrated in parts of England today and many pubs are still named 'The Royal Oak'.

Bits 'n' Bobs

Gardening Jobs

- Apply a liquid feed to any bulbs that have finished flowering, and remove spent flower heads, to encourage more flowers next year
- Thin out direct sown seedlings in the vegetable garden, lifting and discarding seedlings that have been sown too dense, to give crops space to fill out. Do this in a couple of stages, some now and some in a couple of weeks, in case of slug attacks or calamities

Deal with slugs ... May is the month for planting out seedlings. It is also when slugs are at their most voracious, and can wipe out a whole row of painstakingly nurtured new seedlings in a single night. There is almost no point in growing anything from seed if you are not going to take on the slug menace, so be ready.

Remember you don't necessarily have to use chemicals, why not try the old fashioned beer trap; put a container in the ground (buried with lip a cm or two above soil height, so that beetles and other innocents don't fall in) half filled with beer and then remove slugs every morning (disposing of them so that they don't come back).

The app allows you to exactly pin-point the problem with a 'pin drop', so make sure you take your mobile out with you when out and about and report any issues that you find.

After receiving comments about Murmurs the parish council are looking at whether it is feasible to make changes to the size, colour, content of the newsletter. Do you find it interesting? Would you like to see it "improved"?

Generally the newsletter has 12 pages including a colour cover and back page with black & white throughout the inside pages. This currently costs the parish approximately £150 per month to print, plus of course the time to put it together, but it is free to your door.

If we moved to full colour throughout this would add to the cost of printing (approx.. £50 per month). Furthermore if we expanded the length of the magazine this would incur further costs.

If the cost of the magazine publication goes up then clearly this increase needs to be covered by the parish council and this may mean that ultimately the local

precept that you pay with your council tax has to go up to compensate or do we start to charge a fee?

It's not to everyone's taste, but we could offset this by introducing paid advertising into the magazine which would offset the cost either partially or totally depending on the number of advertisements.

Nothing has yet been decided and various options are being explored.

We welcome your input on this, so please have a word with one of your councillors to get your opinion or "bright idea" noted.

Cocktail Recipes for the Jubilee

Coronation Cocktail

25mls grapefruit juice

50mls orange juice

10pms lemon juice

Splash of sugar syrup

Shake together with ice cubes, strain into a glass and top with ice if required

Royal Mint

Fresh mint leaves (about 10)

25mls lime juice

25mls Apple juice

Lemonade

Break mint leaves into a shaker with ice cubes and the other ingredients shake together then strain into a glass, top glass with lemonade

Buckingham Breeze

50 mls Cranberry Juice

50 mls apple juice

15mls Lime juice

Shake ingredients with ice cubes and strain into a glass add more ice if needed
